Why Corner

The Holy Spirit

Jesus, do I need Him?

First, Jesus said, "he will testify to me. And you also testify..." The Advocate of truth sent by The Son from The Father, will ratify our testimonies about Jesus with only one condition, that everything must and will be truthful. Like Pilot asked Jesus, "what is truth?" And we all have this question. Jesus said, "I am the truth, the way and the life." So the truth is based on the person of Jesus, who He is, what He has taught and continues to teach. Testify is defined in this way, "to bear witness to; affirm as fact or truth; attest; to give or afford evidence of in any manner; Law. to state or declare under oath or affirmation, usually in court." This word was used in the New Testament 24 times and referred to those who are disciples and apostles of Jesus. From respected commentators I have learned that there are basically three words in the Greek New Testament which are translated "witness." Two are nouns and one is a verb. One noun refers to a person who bears witness of Jesus with their lives. The verb means the act of bearing witness-the activity of witnessing, our lives, actions, deeds and thoughts are to conform to Jesus-Pattern, mini-me Jesus. The other noun means the bearing of witness and, also, the witness that is borne. The word witness comes to us from the legal sphere and is derived from a root meaning "to bear in mind;" "to remember;" "to be careful." Thus, a witness in the field of law is one who has knowledge of something by recollection and experience, and who can tell about it accurately. Are you a witness of Jesus for yourself and others?

Second, Jesus said, "I have much more to tell you, but you cannot bear it now.... He will not speak on his own, but he will speak what he hears, and will declare to you the things that are coming." Again, Jesus is fully aware of the disciples' comprehension and limitation of grasping some of the truth; therefore, He reassured them that the Spirit of Truth will lead, guide, declare, reveal, and make known to them of future truth, which matter on Faith and Moral: "I told you that he will take from what is mine and declare it to you." So, the Church which Jesus left for the disciples continues to teach and declare the truth. Good news for us: 1) God is still in charge; 2) God is leading & guiding His Church; 3) God is protecting His Church; 4) God is informing His Church; 5) God is insuring His Church; 6) God is shielding His Church from contrary Truth; 7) God is absolute truth, against the prevailing attitude of the world about relative truth; and 8) on & on. Are you listening and embracing these truths as taught by The Church which she receives from Jesus?

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To guide us in our spiritual growth, the Holy Spirit offers us gifts of sanctifying grace. These gifts perfect basic virtues that will lead us to Heaven. When properly used, we stay focused on God.

Wisdom: This gift helps us stay focused on God's will and his plan for us.

Understanding: Lets us grasp truths. It means seeing with the heart, not just the mind.

Counsel: Also called "right judgment," counsel enables us to weigh all the alternatives to make the right choice.

Fortitude: The ability to remain firm against all pressures. (Also called courage.)

Knowledge: A person with knowledge sees more than one dimension of an issue to determine the right path.

Piety: Helps us think of ourselves as children of God and be eager to serve him.

Fear of the Lord: The wonder and awe God inspires encourages us to respect him and all his creations.

Accepting these gifts means identifying and using them. Just don't forget to call on the Holy Spirit for guidance when you do.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Marriage is ideally a parish event today, but in the first three centuries of the church's history, it was a household celebration guided by civil law and pagan customs. Changes happened quickly after the Peace of Constantine in 312, and the fresh air after long persecution brought some creativity. The speech that the father of the groom's family gave before dinner or the veiling or crowning of the bride (or even the spouse's arrival at the honeymoon suite) attracted a prayer of blessing.

With amazing rapidity, worship was propelled out of the intimate setting of house churches to large public gathering spaces, and some parts of the marriage ceremony began to migrate with the growing community to the new spaces. In Rome, the veiling of the bride with the customary daily headgear of a married woman became the central liturgical act, accompanied by a biblical prayer for her integrity and fruitfulness. There were no vows as such (just as there are no vows to this day in the Orthodox marriage rite). In the liturgy, after hearing John's Gospel account of the wedding at Cana, the bride was veiled and blessed, and the priest gave the kiss of peace to the husband, who then gave it to his bride. The liturgy of Rome traveled far, and everywhere it went, marriage became a church celebration.
