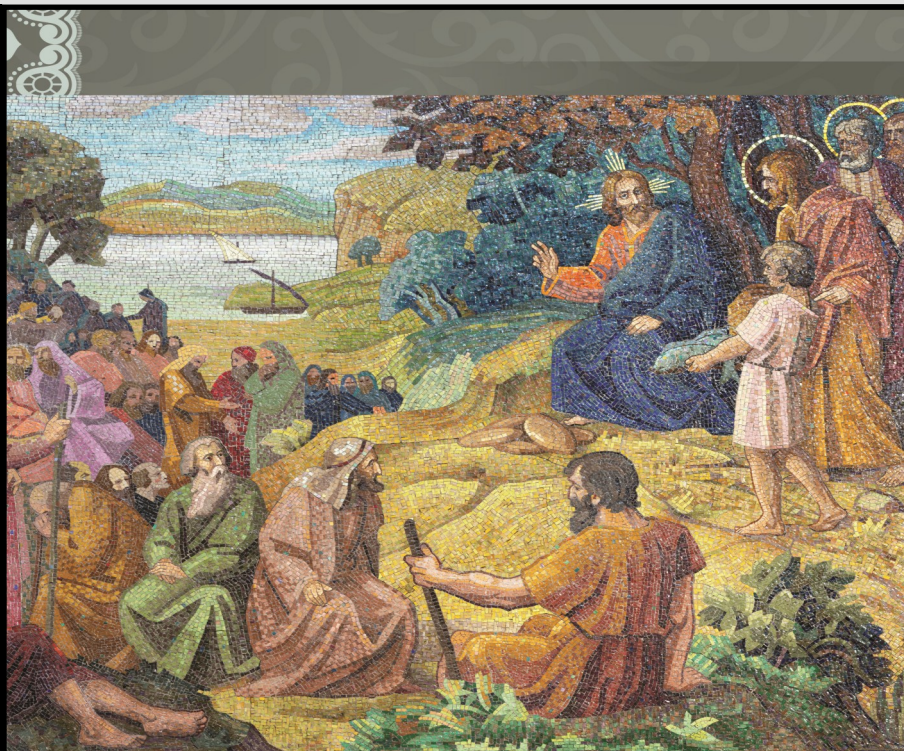

GOSPEL MEDITATION

I was 22 years old, lying in bed one night while on a pilgrimage, when I suddenly sensed an idea in my mind: “Go to the seminary.” There was no voice, no vision, but a gentle and unmistakable clarity. I simply prayed, “Lord, if that’s from you, let me find great joy in it.” Three days later, my heart was bursting with joy. I dropped everything and entered the seminary. The older I get, the stranger my rather careless and hasty departure seems to me. I followed not because it made sense, or because I was especially brave. I went because the Lord called me.

Something like this happens in today’s Gospel. Jesus walks by Simon, Andrew, James, and John and says, “**Come after me**” (Matthew 4:19). And *immediately* they leave their nets and follow. There’s no explanation, no hesitation ... just movement. Why? As St. John says, “**In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us**” (1 John 4:10). They do not leave their nets because his call made perfect, calculable sense. They left them because they were called. And Jesus’ call is powerful. Take a moment this week to remember when Christ first called you. However small or quiet it was, recall it, and give thanks. The more we marvel that Christ has called us personally, the more passionately and freely we will follow him.

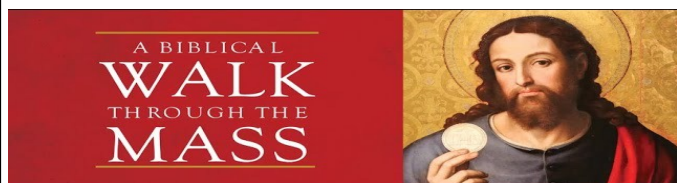
Campus Catholics Sunday Supper

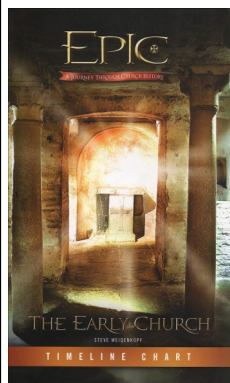

Candlemas—Monday, February 2 at 7:00 p.m.

The Candlemas mass will be celebrated on February 2nd at 7pm and is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, marking when Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to the Jerusalem Temple 40 days after His birth, fulfilling Jewish law and presenting Him as the "Light of the World". It's known for the blessing and distribution of candles, symbolizing Christ, and traditionally concludes the Christmas season.

Key Aspects

Biblical Event:

It commemorates Luke 2:22-40, where the Holy Family meets Simeon and Anna, who recognize Jesus as the promised Messiah, a light for all nations.

Name Origin:

The name "Candlemas" comes from the blessing of candles for use in homes and churches throughout the year.

Symbolism:

The blessed candles represent Jesus as the Light dispelling darkness, fulfilling Old Testament prophecies, and foreshadowing His sacrifice.

Liturgical Significance:

It serves as the traditional end of the Christmas cycle, marking the transition to Lent, as it completes the events of Jesus' nativity.

Observances:

Includes a candlelight procession and Mass where parishioners bring candles to be blessed, connecting the New Covenant (Jesus) with ancient Jewish traditions.

Why to burn blessed candles in your home: The burning of a blessed candle invokes God's presence and protection, creating a sacred atmosphere that repels evil and fosters spiritual growth.

In addition to protection, burning blessed candles can also bring spiritual healing and the bestowal of divine graces. By prayerfully lighting a blessed candle, the faithful open themselves to receive the gifts of repentance, conversion, and physical or emotional healing if it is God's will.

Father will be blessing parishioner's candles in Flannery Hall after the 7pm mass. The CCW will be serving hot chocolate and desserts after the blessing. Any candles can be brought in for the Candlemas blessing, however if parishioner's are looking for quality beeswax or stearin candles, reasonable online offers can be found at the St Jude Shop, Faith Gift Shop had tapers for \$4.15-4.50, EWTN had a larger 6 inch high 1 ½ inch diameter pillar for \$17, and Etsy had some very nice religious small businesses with beautiful options.

Growing in Faith

When things go wrong, choose charity

When difficulties arise, our instinct is often to complain, assign blame, or turn inward with harsh self-criticism. These reactions rarely solve the problem. More often, they weaken charity, cloud judgment, and strain relationships. A more constructive response is to choose kindness deliberately, in thought, speech, and action.

Practice kindness in thought: When self-pity, resentment, comparison, or harsh self-judgment appear, treat them as temptations rather than truths. Pause and redirect your thinking. Replace them with a steady reminder such as, "This is difficult, but I can respond well." Offer yourself the same patience you would give a friend.

Practice kindness in speech: Before speaking, ask whether

your words will help or simply vent frustration. If you would not say something to or about someone you love, refrain. When emotions run high, bring your complaints to prayer first. Naming them before God can bring clarity and restraint.

Practice kindness in action: Focus on what you can do rather than what you cannot control. Choose one concrete act of goodwill: express gratitude, offer help, listen attentively, or perform a small, unnoticed kindness. These simple actions restore perspective and soften difficult moments.

Responding with kindness does not ignore problems. It creates the conditions for peace, clearer judgment, and constructive action to take root.

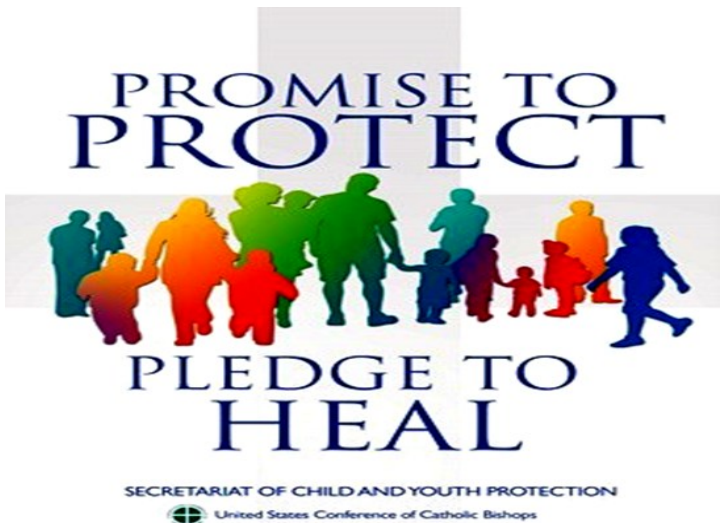
